René Delsanne

René Delsanne is a former professor of actuarial science at the University of Quebec at Montreal. Following his tenure at UQAM, he started an advisory firm and currently works with several pension funds including Montreal Transit Commission, TC Transcontinental, Montreal Police and Ferique Funds. He also sits on the Board of Humania Assurance and on the Independent Review Committee of one Canadian Investment Firm.

Prior to joining the faculty at the University of Quebec at Montreal, he was Vice President of Natcan Investment Management, in charge of client services, product and business development. Before joining Natcan, René was a partner in the Montreal office of MLH+A Consulting Actuaries, where he launched the Investment consulting practice. René completed his Master of Science (Mathematics) from Laval University and is a Chartered Financial Analyst as well as a fellow with the Canadian Institute of Actuaries. He spoke frequently at conferences including the International Foundation of Employee Benefit Plans and the International Actuarial Association

Neil Gross

Neil Gross is a Toronto-based capital markets policy consultant. He is a member of the national Investor Advisory Panel for Canada's provincial and territorial investment market regulators, following several years as chair of the Ontario Securities Commission's Investor Advisory Panel. Neil also serves on the OSC's CEO Advisory Council and the Mortgage Brokering Technical Advisory Committee at Ontario's Financial Services Regulatory Authority. In addition, Neil is a director of portfolio management firm R.N. Croft Financial Group and a member of the independent review committees for several investment fund managers. Previously, Neil enjoyed a 30-year career as a lawyer litigating investor loss claims and regulatory enforcement cases. He then served as executive director of FAIR Canada while concurrently appointed to the OSC's Exempt Market Advisory Committee and Seniors Expert Advisory Committee. Now, as a periodic columnist for The Globe and Mail, he draws on those experiences to explore the social impact of financial regulation.

Tracy LeMay has been in the investment journalism field for more than 30 years. Until July 2017, he served as editor-in-chief of Investment Executive (IE) newspaper and investmentexective.com. During his career, he has written for numerous general interest, trade and institutional publications in Canada and the U.S., and has co-authored courses for the Canadian Securities Institute. Currently, he is a contributor for investmentexecutive.com, writing monthly on exchange-traded funds. He is a bachelor of journalism graduate of Carleton University and holds a Certified Investment Manager (CIM) designation.

Ellen Roseman

Ellen Roseman is a personal finance journalist whose columns ran in the Toronto Star for 20 years. She was the business editor at the Star from 1997 to 1998 after moving from the Globe and Mail, where she was a columnist for 20 years and an associate editor at the Report on Business. She is now a contributing writer at Canadian MoneySaver magazine and hosts the monthly MoneySaver Podcast, which started in 2018. Ellen has been a continuing education instructor at the University of Toronto since 2004, teaching a popular course called Investing for Beginners. And she developed a financial literacy workshop for young adults called Financial Basics, in conjunction with the Financial Consumer Agency of Canada and the Ontario Securities Commission. She is the author of seven non-fiction books, starting with Consumer, Beware! in 1974, and most recently, Fight Back: 81 Ways to Help You Save Money and Protect Yourself from Corporate Trickery, in 2013. She was on the board of directors of FAIR Canada, a national charity that advocates for investor rights, for more than a decade and also acted as chair.
